Please read the following Euthanasia Policy, and be prepared to share your thoughts on this sensitive issue at your interview.

Cat Care Society provides a safe and comfortable environment for cats accepted into the shelter. All cats considered adoptable will remain as residents of the shelter until they are adopted or humanely euthanized. Cat Care Society does not practice routine euthanasia to create space for more cats, however there are certain instances when staff believes it is more important to stop the suffering rather than save the lives of cats.

The decision to euthanize will be made by the shelter staff after an examination of the cat and a determination of the quality of life experienced by the cat. When it is determined that the cat will experience needless suffering in order to keep him/her alive, the cat will be humanely euthanized. Cats that test positive for feline leukemia or feline aids and cats that show aggression toward humans are also euthanized.
